
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The Women's Print History Project is pleased to announce the arrival of its very own podcast. Introducing: the WPHP Monthly Mercury.

Inspired by periodicals of the same period, the WPHP Monthly Mercury dives into the gritty and gorgeous details of working on this database to recover women's print history. Sharing the stories of prolific and not-so-prolific women authors and the oft-widowed women publishers, printers, and booksellers of the period, as well as the rabbit-hole-filled processes of recovery and the adventures of our research assistants, our project manager, and our primary investigator, the WPHP Monthly Mercury centres the discovery of women and their work.
